Performing chest compressions and using a defibrillator is very straightforward and the impact it can have will last a lifetime.

Learning to restart a heart will mean children can be there for loved ones when they need them most.

By giving pupils the skills to help increase the number of people who can survive a cardiac arrest, together we can make London a safer place to live, work and enjoy.

Introduction

At London Ambulance Service, we are committed to providing your school with free high-quality training for your Year 8 pupils to learn life-saving skills. This has been made possible thanks to funding provided by NHS Charities Together to our dedicated charity, London Ambulance Charity.

Why it is important to teach school children?

Teaching pupils life-saving skills is one of the key ways we can improve out-of-hospital cardiac arrest survival rates. In countries where life-saving skills are already taught in schools, cardiac arrest survival rates are more than double than those countries that don't.

The Department for Education states that by the end of secondary school, pupils should know life-saving skills, including how to deliver CPR and the purpose of defibrillators and when one might be needed. On their recommendation that CPR is usually best taught after 12 years old, we will be working with Year 8 pupils.


How can the London Lifesavers Schools Programme help?

Our London Lifesavers Schools Programme aims to teach students the simple steps to follow when someone is in cardiac arrest and give them the confidence to save a life.

Schools offer a great environment for young people to learn. With this in mind, we have created a programme to meet the needs of Year 8 pupils to ensure they are confident and able to save a life. The programme is provided free of charge to all schools.








Course overview

Our Community Resuscitation Trainers will work with you to ensure our training package works around your school day.

- ✓ Maximum 60 students per session
- Student to trainer ratio 6:1
- Session length approximately 35 minutes

All of the training we offer is delivered by medically-trained experts from London Ambulance Service.





What we require from you

We will need an appropriately sized training space to deliver the sessions. The students need plenty of floor space to work on – we will set up our skills stations in this space, so a sports or assembly hall with gym mats is ideal. We provide all other equipment. Access to IT facilities to include large screen/projector is desirable but not essential.

The students will receive an e-certificate, London Lifesavers badge and become part of our community of lifesavers.




Application

Once our team have processed your application you will receive an email confirming the training delivery date, a questionnaire and introduction to your Community Resuscitation Trainer. The questionnaire provides information that helps us create a training plan around your school day and assist with any support you might require.



Confirmation

Your Community Resuscitation Trainer will confirm the itinerary of the day and plan for training delivery.





Having access to defibrillators in schools significantly increases the chance of pupils, teachers and visitors surviving a cardiac arrest.

In July 2022, the Department for Education announced that it would provide Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) to all state-funded primary, secondary, and special schools in England, where provision is not already in place.

Deliveries will take place automatically to eligible schools over the academic year. School details are passed to the supplier, who contact schools once their defibrillator has been dispatched.

Once you are in receipt of your defibrillator please register it with The Circuit – the national defibrillator network and ensure it is placed in an accessible location. This can either be on a wall bracket within the school or in an unlocked cabinet on the outside of the school building, so it's available to the local community.

We recommend you tell all staff of its location and display a sign prominently at the entrance of your building so that visitors and passers-by are aware that a defibrillator is available.
